Under the **Presidency of Greece**, the Security Council held **two signature events**:

• A high-level open debate on the Maintenance of international peace and security (20/21 May), focused on strengthening maritime security through international cooperation for global stability (S/2025/300). The Prime Minister of Greece presided over the meeting and the Secretary-General briefed.

• A high-level open debate on the **Protection of civilians in armed conflict** (22/23 May), focused on **addressing emerging threats, ensuring the safety of civilians, humanitarian and UN personnel, journalists and media professionals** and **enhancing accountability mechanisms** (S/2025/301). The Minister for Foreign Affairs of Greece presided over the meeting.

## **Key Topics**

The Middle East (5, 14 and 21 May), Sudan and South Sudan (8, 19 and 30 May) and Libya (15, 16 and 29 May) were the most frequently considered country- or region-specific items in open and closed discussions, followed by the Middle East, including the Palestinian Question (13 and 28 May), Non-proliferation/DPRK (7 and 29 May), and Ukraine (29 and 30 May). Other country- or region-specific issues considered by the Council included Bosnia and Herzegovina, Haiti, India/Pakistan and Somalia.

Under thematic items, the Council held a meeting under the **Protection of civilians** 

in armed conflict regarding the implementation of resolution 2474 (2019) (15 May). On 8 May, the Council and the General Assembly held a joint informal interactive dialogue with the Peacebuilding Commission on the 2025 Peacebuilding Architecture Review. The Presidents of the General Assembly and Security Council, together with the Chair of the Peacebuilding Commission, delivered opening remarks. The Co-Facilitators (Egypt and Slovenia) briefed on the elements paper for the review. On 27 May, the Council held another informal interactive dialogue on Libya (resolution 2292 (2016)/Operation IRINI). The Director of Peace Partnerships and Crisis Management Directorate of the European External Action Service provided a briefing.

### **Procedural notes**

On **27 May**, the Council and the General Assembly held simultaneous meetings for the **election** of one member of the **International Court of Justice**, following the resignation of Judge Nawaf Salam (Lebanon) (effective 14 January 2025). The Council and the General Assembly elected **Mr. Mahmood Daifallah Hmoud** (Jordan) as a member of the Court for the remainder of the term (see S/PV.9922, S/2024/234, S/2024/235 and S/2024/236).

On 29 May, Council members agreed to elect the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of subsidiary bodies of the Council for the period ending 31 December 2025 (see S/2025/2).

On **30 May**, the Council adopted its **annual report to the General Assembly** (A/79/2), covering the period from 1 January to 31 December 2024 (S/2025/336). The representative of the Russian Federation, whose delegation coordinated the drafting of the report's introduction, presented the text to the Council (see S/PV.9927).

#### Decisions and press statements

In May, the Council adopted three resolutions.

On 8 May, acting under Chapter VII of the Charter, the Council adopted resolution 2779 (2025), with 12 votes in favor and three abstentions (see S/PV.9913), which extended the mandate of the United Nations Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS) until 30 April 2026.

On **29 May**, acting under Chapter VII of the Charter, the Council adopted **resolution 2780 (2025)**, with 13 votes in favor and two abstentions (see S/PV.9925), which **extended for six months** the authorizations for Member States, acting nationally or through regional organizations, related to the inspections of vessels on the high seas off the coast of **Libya** for better implementation of the arms embargo.

On **30 May**, also under Chapter VII of the Charter, the Council adopted **resolution 2781 (2025)**, with 9 votes in favor and 6 abstentions (see S/PV.9928)), which extended the **sanctions regime in relation to South Sudan** until **31 May 2026**.

Additionally, the Council issued two **press statements** - on the escalation of violence, including civilian casualties, in Libya (SC/16064) and on the terrorist attack in **Pakistan** (SC/16069).

#### Other activities

On 23 May, Council members convened an Arria-formula meeting on "Freshwater Resources and Related Infrastructure under Attack. Protecting Water in Armed Conflict – Protecting Civilian Lives" co-organized by Algeria, Panama and Sierra Leone, and supported by nine Member States.
